

FERPA is:

- › A Federal law designed to protect the privacy of student education records, establish the right of parents or eligible students to inspect and review the student's education records, and provide guidelines for the correction of inaccurate or misleading information contained in such records.

Is there a difference between “bullying” and “being mean”?

Although bullying is always mean, being mean is not always bullying (as that term is defined under the Education Law). In the public schools we address all cases of student misconduct that we know about regardless of what that behavior may be called.

What consequences does my child receive if misconduct is determined?

- › The principal or other school administrator will investigate the student's behavior.
- › The principal or other administrator considers the child's behavior in light of the Code of Conduct and the results of his / her investigation.
- › In cases involving student athletes, the administrator will also consider the Athletic Code of Conduct.

My child and another child did the exact same thing...but my child received a greater consequence. Why?

- **Scotia-Glenville Schools practice progressive discipline.**
- **Factors taken into consideration when determining consequences may include the facts and circumstances of the particular incident, the child's prior disciplinary record (if any), and whether the child is a student with a disability under education law.**

Why don't you expel students who misbehave?

- Students of compulsory school age must attend school per state law (through the completion of the school year in which they turn 16).
- By law, building principals may suspend a student for up to five (5) school days.
- Under certain conditions, a superintendent may suspend a student for an extended period of time following a hearing held in accordance with Education Law Section 3214.
- The Commissioner of Education has recognized that “permanently expelling a student is an extreme penalty which is educationally unsound except under the most extraordinary circumstances.”
